## The Program for April 12, 2006

**Speaker:** Carol Hollenshead, Director, U-M Center for the Education of Women

**Topic:** "Women in the Developed World: An Underdeveloped Resource"

In the four decades since the university's Center for the Education of Women was founded, as we will learn from our speaker, women have made great strides in educational and career achievements. Nevertheless, U.S. data demonstrates that women have yet to reach economic equality. Professor Hollenshead will share her views on what still needs to be done.

## Notes from the Program of April 5



City Administrator Roger Fraser introduced our honorable mayor, John Hieftje, who spoke on “What are they thinking about over at City Hall?”

The mayor lauded Rotary and John Laird for the tree plantings program, saying “I can’t think of a finer gift to the city.” The city, he said, has a balanced budget, a healthy reserve and a good bond rating. Looking ahead, all of the major union contracts are up this year.

Energy costs are up, but, the mayor said, we’ll be using B-50 fuel, which is half vegetable oil, in some city vehicles. “And we’re working to buy green energy, especially wind power which is a solid source of energy.” Wind is stable, less expensive than coal after 4-5 years from startup and it generates a job potential of 8,000. “I’ve studied the environmental impact statement of wind,” John said, and concluded it was a good energy source.

Rail transit is a desirable goal. “We have 60,000 people commute to Ann Arbor daily,” he said, “and that’s a lot of cars and greenhouse gases.” He said it would cost \$500 million to add two more lanes to US 23 which feeds into Ann Arbor. He cited an award the city received from Bicycling Magazine, and said we were number three in the country, after Boulder, Colo., and Eugene OR in promoting the use of bicycles downtown.

Another goal of the mayor is to have more people living downtown. For that, we need “six, eight, ten story buildings.” And oh, by the way, “let’s not have any more ugly buildings in Ann Arbor!”

The greenbelt is moving forward, but there’s a shortage of matching funds from the state. He favored underground parking as opposed to surface parking because “real estate is too important to use for surface lots.” Recycling? We’re making money from recycling, Mayor Hieftje said, and we capture more than 50 percent of the waste stream.
