Speakers: Jennifer Gratz and Paul Hillegonds

**Topic:** "Civil Rights Showdown - Pro & Con on Proposal 2"

According to the ballot language, Proposal 2 on the November 7 ballot would "amend the State Constitution to ban affirmative action programs that give preferential treatment to groups or individuals based on their race, gender, color, ethnicity or national origin for public employment, education or contracting purposes." Jennifer Gratz, Executive Director of the organization behind the proposal, the Michigan Civil Rights Initiative Committee, and plaintiff in the affirmative action case that U-M lost (Gratz v. Bollinger, which challenged racial preferences in LS&A admissions), will speak for the proposal. Paul Hillegonds, former Speaker of the State House of Representatives and now Senior Vice President for Corporate Affairs at DTE Energy, will speak against it. The program will start no later than 12:45, to give both speakers ample time to state their case and take questions, so be sure to attend and bring good questions with you.

## Notes from the Program of October 11, 2006

Jim Frenza introduced Mel Drumm, executive director of the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum, speaking on "The Past, Present and Future Vision of the Ann Arbor Hands-On Museum." Now 25 years old, the HOM is more than just a children's museum. "It's for kids of all ages," Mel said, who admitted he had big shoes to fill when he took over from Jim Frenza.

It took people of vision to see in the old downtown firehouse the community resource that the HOM has become. Cynthia Yao had a dream of building a children's science museum. A board, with Joe Fitzsimmons on board, worked hard and got state funding. The firehouse became available in 1978 and it opened its doors in 1982. "The exhibits have science behind them, but they let us be playful, learn and have fun." He said the exhibits were "content-rich" from the get-go.

In 1987 the HOM expanded to the 3rd and 4th floors. That space, too, was soon full of people. In 1993, HOM purchased adjacent buildings. This year marked a community-wide effort "to plan our future and to celebrate 25 years on Oct. 13, 2007." The museum's mission statement is "to inspire people to discover the wonder of science, math and technology." Its vision is "to be the leader in imaginative learning experiences," not second best or runner-up or honorable mention. Mel said the museum "offered a rich social environment for learning."

HOM quick facts: It's hosted 3 million guests since 1982. It draws more than 54 percent of its guests from outside Ann Arbor. Its \$1.8 million budget includes more than 60 percent from earned revenues. Its strategic goals of good people leadership, wonderful guest experiences and sustainability all add up to ownership of the facility by users and the community.

**Visiting Rotarians:** David Epstein of the Sea Point Club in Cape Town, South Africa joined us for his second visit. Here's an interesting report on a past visiting Rotarian, Fritz Schneider of Kenosha WI. He came to a meeting in August with John Dahl, a local Kiwanian. John wrote in a recent thank-you note to President Ingrid; "This past weekend we were in Kenosha to walk with Fritz in the Sunday CROP walk. Nine family members walked the 3k with him. He is now 90 and decided that this would be his last crop walk after having walked in it for the past 20 years. Once again, he was the top fundraiser with \$2100 pledged and his 20 year total is now over \$30,000." Fritz has been in Rotary for over fifty years and remains an excellent example of both "Service above Self" and "Lead the Way."

**Rotarians in the News:** In the Ann Arbor Business Review for September 28-October 4, 2006, Dick Carlisle, principal or Carlisle/Wortman Associates in Ann Arbor, was featured in its "Executive Profile" section. In the October 5-11, 2006 issue of the same publication, it was reported that Bettye Elkins was named in the first edition of "Michigan Super Lawyers." That same issue of the Business review also contained a one-page feature on remote sensors at General Dynamics in its "Innovation Michigan" section. John Ackenhusen's area there was highlighted and he was quoted extensively for the article.

**Rotarian Magazine for October:** This issue is focused on the 2007 Convention to be held in Salt Lake City from June 17-20. Other items of interest include the fact that October is Archives Month and the report the first all-Russian district has been chartered. The first Rotary club in Russia was chartered in 1990. The new district 2220 includes 50 clubs west of the Ural Mountains, a region that includes Moscow and St. Petersburg. Finally, the total number of Paul Harris Fellowships has now reached the one million mark just as the 2006-2007 EREY campaign gets under way in November.
