

Speaker: Lester Robinson, CEO, Wayne County Airport Authority

Topic: Breaking New Ground – Master Plan for Metro Airport

Detroit Metro Airport's new North Terminal will open in September, the last step in a 20-year Master Plan that has solidified Metro's standing as a world-class air transport hub. The number of passengers now served is expected to double by 2025 – to almost 60 million per year. CEO Lester Robinson will discuss the Authority's new Preferred Development Plan for enhanced capacity to handle this growth and further strengthen our region's competitive position in the world economy.

Notes from the Meeting of July 30, 2008

Chuck Cares introduced Dr. Oran Hesterman, CEO of the Fair Food Foundation, which has its headquarters on Main Street in Ann Arbor. Formed to promote sustainable agriculture, this foundation is preparing to provide grants to promote its objectives. As a stark example of the extent of damage from farming practices, the speaker identified a large "dead zone" area in the Gulf of Mexico just outside the Mississippi delta, where nothing lives. He attributed this to destructive run-off from farms in the Mississippi River drainage area.

The average distance that food travels between production and consumption in the United States is about 1500 miles. Aside from the issues of spoilage, this transportation burden has become progressively more significant as energy prices continue

to increase. In addition, much of the farm labor is performed by migrant labor, often un-documented workers. Farms have been pushed progressively further from urban areas by suburban sprawl for roads, houses, and

shopping malls.

The speaker commended the voters of Ann Arbor for their willingness to tax themselves to preserve near-by farmland. In contrast, the city of Detroit is largely without a source of fresh farm products. Its residents depend largely on fast-food stores and gas station markets for their food source. As a consequence, children suffer from numerous dietary conditions and illnesses brought about by poor diets.

Dr. Hesterman said that the agricultural system is largely broken. The Fair Food Foundation is promoting the following strategies aimed at improvement:

- Develop local food sources; farmers' markets are good examples.
- Support entrepreneurship and sources of capital.
- Fix the "broken public policy" regarding agriculture.
- Organize urban youth using art and culture.

Funded by a family who wishes to remain anonymous, the Foundation is brand new. Applications for grants will start in November, with Detroit MI and Oakland CA as target cities. One-third of the land in Detroit is vacant. One analysis showed that even a small shift in food supplies for urban areas can have a profound effect on the people and the economy.
